Attendance

Hints and Tips No 1: Responsibilities

Parent/s or caregivers are required – by law – to provide a written or verbal explanation to the

principal within seven days of any absence as to why their child was not at school.

It is important that the school receives a written or verbal explanation because:

- 1. It is a parent's legal obligation to explain their child's absence within seven days.
- 2. It is a requirement that the school investigate all unexplained absences.
- 3. It avoids the school and the School Attendance Office from making unnecessary investigations.
- 4. It is the way the school knows that your child was legitimately absent and not truanting from school.

If you have any difficulties in providing a written explanation for your child's absence, please contact your school principal.

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

Finley High School has worked closely in the past with the Youth Careers Services Local Community Partnership based in Deniliquin. Recently the Federal Government called tenders to renew contracts for Local Community Partnerships. We are now under a new Local Community Partnership called Murray Industry and Community Employment Partnership (M.I.C.E.E.P.) based in Albury. This week we have asked all Year Eleven students studying Hospitality, Metals and Engineering and Primary Industries to nominate a workplace that they would like to work at in Week Eleven of Term Two from 28th June to 2nd July. This will be Week One (thirty five hours) of the compulsory seventy hours of workplacement in the VET courses.

Raising Confident Children

The following is taken from a newsletter distributed by Michael Grose. I thought it had some great points that we probably have all heard before, but are good to be reminded of. In this article, Michael outlines ten ways to build confidence in kids.

The power of parents to shape a child is enormous. As a parent, you are in the prime position to mirror back to kids how they see themselves. You do this through your messages, your expectations and how you treat your child.

Confident kids are more likely to make the most of their potential as they'll extend themselves both socially and learning-wise. Failure does not reflect on them personally. Fears and anxieties, while present, do not stop them from trying new activities. So how can you develop real and lasting sense of confidence in your kids? In the forthcoming newsletters I will display the ten points.

- Model confident mindsets: Kids need to hear what a confident mindset sounds like. Do not put yourself down if you make a mistake. For example, if something goes wrong, is throwing things and swearing a positive way of dealing with it? Instead make sure that your thinking and actions, reflect that mistakes are acceptable and part of learning.
- Encourage kids to look on the bright side.
 Optimism is catching and helps kids overcome their fears. Help kids set their antennae to look for the good, something positive in any situation.
- 3. Help them understand self-talk. That little voice inside their head can talk them up or down. Low confidence kids use a great deal of negative self-talk. Get kids to listen to their self-talk and help them work out alternative messages that help them rather than hold them back. For example, instead of 'I am hopeless at netball', 'my passing and catching skills are good, but I just need to improve my footwork'.

Yanco Camp for Agriculture Students

Forty Finley High School students with an interest in agriculture will have an amazing experience next week when they attend a specifically designed course Murrumbidgee Rural Studies Centre at Yanco.

This course has been funded by a Next Gen Farmers Grant from the Australian Government's Department of Forestry and Fisheries received by Youth Career Services. Student travel and accommodation costs are met by this grant. Staff attending will be Mrs Robyn O'Leary and Mr Gary Webb.

Students will be involved in leadership and team building activities, career planning and personal goal setting sessions together with practical activities in specific agricultural research fields. A special highlight will be a full-day field trip to Rockdale Feedlot, NSW Fisheries practical workshop, Manildra Flour Mill and Forests NSW nurseries.

Industry mentors will speak with students about their personal career paths, opportunities available with agricultural industries within the Riverina and natural resource management.

Each evening students will be engaged in a range of activities relating to leadership development, electronic communication and stock management planning.

Following the week of activities, students will be reporting to their peers, the general community and industry specific groups so that information and experiences gained will be appreciated by a range of age groups and rural industries within the Finley region.

The camp is designed to show students there are many career opportunities within agriculture despite the current drought conditions, limited water allocations and the costs involved with the purchase of land and machinery.
