Year Six Orientation Day

On Tuesday, Finley high school hosted its orientation day for the Year 7's of 2017. 60 nervous students came from the surrounding feeder schools to experience a day at high school. The day was planned to:

- allow the students to become familiar with the physical layout of the school,
- to enable the students to meet other students and form connections
- to meet the teachers, support staff, and older students
- to experience different classes and learn the expectations of a high school student

The students participated in a scavenger hunt led by Year 10 leaders and participated in a group activity, which involved the creating a device for an egg, that would protect it when dropped from an elevation of 4 metres. After recess, they were divided into three groups and experience mini-lessons of English, Art, Drama, PD/H/PE and Music. The group completed their day with a presentation from Charles Sturt University, aimed at transition. All students were positive in their interactions, and seemed pleased with their day. Many purchased their book packs, allowing them to organise their books before the commencement of the year. Book Packs are available from the canteen, costing \$70 including a calculator, for those still wishing to purchase theirs. Some enrolment forms and birth certificates are still outstanding, and we would appreciate excursion costs being completed before the end of the term. Year 7 Respectful Behaviours Program

Year Nine Empowerment Day

On Wednesday 7th of December a team of staff organised a Year 9 Empowerment Day. The boys and girls participated in separate workshops targeting current social issues relevant to their gender and age.

The boys heard from our School Counsellor, Ms Wales, about sugar intake and the effects on their mental and physical wellbeing; our local Ambulance Officer, Mr Wane, spoke to them about risk taking and his job. They were then split into smaller group to rotate through workshops run by some of our male staff members, such as: risk taking, consent and masculinity - what makes a man? In the afternoon they did some team building and trust activities to build connections and respectful friendships with peers.

The girls had our local dietician Miss Crocker talk about healthy eating with her main message being all foods are food just some should be consumed less than others, followed by Ms Wood highlighting the effects that media has on body image. Their mini workshops gave them the opportunity to discuss topics such as: identifying strengths, body image, what is consent and staying well, both mentally and physically, including how to carry out effective breast checks. A big thank you goes to Judith, Jenny & Wendy from Intereach and Ricky & Jane from Vinnies for supporting the day by facilitating these groups. In the afternoon the girls were fortunate enough to watch the current body image documentary Embrace.



Bring your own device at Finley High School

Finley High School has elected to adopt the 'Bring your own device' policy in line with the majority of school across the state. This means that we will continue to be able to offer our students a wide variety of activities utilising technology in all Key Learning Areas. Students with their own device are able to access the school server and internet, and are entitled to FREE Microsoft software via the schools Portal.

We have in the past published a document detailing the ideal specifications of a laptop that enable it to operate quickly, have long battery life, be light weight and robust. Depending on the enthusiasm of a salesman this can quickly become a very expensive machine.

In consultation with our technical support officer, we have come up with the following suggestions.

- Most laptops around the \$400 mark are perfectly adequate. **Remember you do not need to purchase software**, just the latest Windows or apple platform. That being said the more you spend the more you get in speed, performance and reliability.
- It should not be too large. The bigger it is the heavier it is, more power it uses and more space it takes up.
- Laptops with a key board are recommended.
- All modern laptops with wireless will have the correct connect ability.
- Six hour battery life would be ideal.

If your child is not able to bring their own device we do have a limited number of laptops that are loaned out on a period by period basis. This is not ideal as it takes time out of class, but is the best compromise that we can offer. We do not have the funding to provide all students with a laptop.

This year has been the first of BYOD at Finley High School. We are pleased with the uptake by students and parents. Nearly 200 students have utilised the new and refurbished lockers to safely store their laptops. We have seen a marked increase in the use of technology in the classroom this year, especially in Years Seven and Eight. When students come to school at the start of the year we will assist them in accessing their portal and to download the free software.

I hope that this is of some assistance. If you have any queries please contact the school, we will be only too pleased to help.

STEM Scholarship

The STEM Scholarship is awarded to a female student in Year Twelve at Finley High School to commence tertiary studies in 2017 in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). This could include all the health sciences, agricultural sciences, animal sciences, computer technology, food technology, robotics, nursing, sports sciences, psychology as well as the more traditional STEM courses.

This scholarship is for a hardworking student with a passion in their chosen area of study and not necessarily the person with the best HSC results. All female students intending to study at TAFE or university in any of the STEM areas are encouraged to apply.

The scholarship is awarded in late December following the release of the HSC results and ATAR scores.

Applicants will be required to submit a written application and attend an interview in the week following the release of the HSC results and ATAR scores.

All written applications should be submitted to Principal of Finley High School.

The application should address the following criteria:

1. The STEM related course that you intend to study.

2. Why you want to study the particular course chosen.
3. How \$1000 will assist you in the first year of tertiary study?
4. What your future career aspirations may be post tertiary study?
5. Include a personal reference and final Year Twelve school report.


Family and Community Services High School Scholarship 2017

Scholarships are open to those receiving housing assistance from the Department of Family and Community Services, community housing providers or Aboriginal housing. This also includes students:

- In Out of Home Care – currently under the care of the Minister

- In transitional or crisis accommodation or receiving supported accommodation
- Through a specialist homelessness service
- Receiving private rental assistance such as a private rental subsidy, bond loan or
- Tenancy guarantee.




