#### Principal's Report

#### **Photos**

#### **Youth Frontiers**

#### **BYOD**

Learning in the 21<sup>st</sup> century is very different to learning when I went to school. Back in those days, computers were not the desk top variety, but took up the space of whole rooms in universities and large corporations.

Over the past 30 years, they have become stronger, more powerful, and able to complete a vast array of tasks in a very short amount of time and can fit into your pocket. It is therefore crucial that students in schools today have available to them computers, laptops, which they can use for learning.

Finley High School has a BYOD policy (Bring Your Own Device) where students are encouraged to bring their laptops to school to be used in the classroom. We purchased student laptop lockers to allow students to store their devices safely

between classes and teachers have been encouraging students to use their laptops for learning in classrooms across the school.

The school also purchased a limited number of laptops to assist those students who were unable to purchase a laptop, to participate in classes.

It has come to our attention that some students, who had previously been bringing a laptop to school, have not been bringing them and instead, insist on using the schools laptops. This is placing a shortage on the laptops available for the students who do not own their own. The school does not have the resources to purchase a laptop for each student to use.

So I seek your help in encouraging your child to bring their laptop to school to use in their classes. This will ensure all students have fair access to the technology tools so vital for learning in the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

#### **Meningococcal Vaccinations**

The NSW government has initiated a Meningococcal W Response Program in 2017, which will target 17 and 18 Year olds in school this year. Students in Year Eleven and Year Twelve will be able to receive the vaccination for this strain of the disease at Finley High School early next term. It is timely to remind parents that students in high school can also get head lice. We have had a report of a student with head lice and would encourage all parents to be vigilant with checking their children's hair regularly.

#### **Legal Studies Supreme Court Excursion**

On Monday 6<sup>th</sup> March the HSC Legal Studies class went to Melbourne to take part in a the Supreme Court education program and explore the courts and Victoria Police Museum.

Students explored the Victoria Police Museum and were able to read about the Russell Street Bombing and how they came to solve the case. They also got the opportunity to look at different types of forensic evidence equipment and watch snapshots of what the police do in the community. After exploring the museum, some of the students used the opportunity to try on the police uniform and get a feel for the job.

In the afternoon we went and watched a trial in the County Court about drug trafficking and the students were able to see police officers in the witness box giving evidence about the crimes.

The students then took part in the Supreme Court education program which is run by retired volunteers who showed the students through one of the Supreme Courts and quizzed them on their knowledge of the people involved in a court case and their roles. They allowed the students to sit in different areas of the court and imagine what it is like being involved in a Supreme Court trial. We then got to view part of a murder trial where police officers were giving evidence in the witness box. This allowed students to see the time consuming process of a trial and the resources involved which will allow them to make use of their experience when writing extended responses in their exams. We were then taken to the Supreme Court Library where we were shown the documents of Ned Kelly's trial and different portraits of previous Supreme Court Justices.

It was a very worthwhile day for students to see for themselves how the law operates and give greater understanding of the concepts they have studied in class. Thanks to the students for their outstanding behaviour on the day and to Jodi Brown for letting us borrow her car for the trip.

#### **Boys and Girls Soccer**

#### **Deniliquin Show**



#### **NSW School Vaccination Program**

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2017 the following vaccines will be offered to Year Seven students:

- Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine in a 3-dose schedule at 0, 2 and 6 months
- dTpa vaccine (Diptheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (whooping cough)) as a single dose
- varicella vaccine (chickenpox) as a single dose;

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians. To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

• read all the information provided

- complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that students who commence HPV vaccination in school clinics in Year Seven but do not complete the course during the school year may be offered catch-up doses at school in Year Eight. Students who have any HPV doses at their GP will be advised to complete the course with their GP.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at <a href="https://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation">www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation</a>

To improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses throughout the year where possible.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic either as a physical card or a text message sent to the mobile number recorded on the consent form (within 1 business day). Parents/guardians should ensure that this record is kept for future reference and should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this Record of Vaccination.

#### **School Drive Subsidy**

If you live a long way from public transport and need to drive a student to a public transport point or to school, you may be able to get financial assistance.

The School Drive Subsidy provides eligible parents and guardians twice-yearly payments to help cover some of the expenses of getting children to school.

#### MENINGOCOCCAL W PROTECTION FOR NSW TEENS

The NSW Government will fund a new school-based meningococcal vaccination program for all Year 11 and 12 students to combat the rise in the W strain of this potentially fatal disease, Minister for Health Brad Hazzard announced today.

"This week I made clear to senior health officials that the NSW Government would do whatever possible to protect our young people against Meningococcal W and other strains," Mr Hazzard said.

"The NSW Government is now allocating \$9 million for this vaccination program in its first year, which will see 180,000 vulnerable teenagers in all high schools eligible to be vaccinated."

The NSW Meningococcal W Response Program will target 17 and 18 year olds this year, as immunisation experts advise that this age group is particularly at risk because of their physical closeness with peers (e.g. kissing, coughing, sneezing).

Meningococcal W has become a prominent strain nationally and in NSW, with the state's notifications almost tripling since 2015. Over the last 10 years, the W strain has had an eight per cent mortality rate compared with a four per cent rate for other strains.

The program will start in Term Two, and be expanded to cover other upper high school students in subsequent years.

If any Year 11 and 12 students miss out on the vaccine at school, they will be able to get the vaccine for free from their GP later in the year.

Under the program teenagers will receive a four-antigen vaccine, which provides protection against the A, C, W and Y strains.

The NSW Government takes the risks posed by meningococcal disease very seriously and will continue to monitor international responses and advice and work with the Commonwealth Government on the national response.

A team of swimmers and track & field athletes, respective qualified coaches and Head of Delegation are being sought for this amazing sporting and cultural experience.


