Beacon Girls Online Careers Mentoring Project

On Wednesday 7th March 12 girls participated in the Beacon Project where they had the opportunity to interact and engage with working mentors through a 2 hour online ZOOM conference. This allowed the girls to think about their futures, build positive relationships and fostered their resilience and confidence.

One of the mentors was Emma Isaacs the CEO of Australia's largest network for women, "Business Chicks" which is a community of more than 400,000 women (and men!) worldwide, and who produces more than 90 sell-out events each year with some of the world's most influential and inspiring speakers, including Jamie Oliver, Nigella Lawson, Sir Richard Branson, and Sir Bob Geldof.

The girls had the opportunity to work with their mentors to discuss career goals and 21st Century workplace skills and pathways. Through sharing stories and experiences the process allowed the girls to boost their confidence to communicate effectively and to use their critical and creative thinking skills to investigate future pathways and possible career opportunities. Hopefully as a result of sharing in the experiences of their mentors and thinking about their own passions and strengths the girls will be able to take informed actions in moving forward with their career plans.

International Autism Awareness Week

Finley High School proudly supports and advocates for students with Autism and as such on the 27th March we will be celebrating International Autism Awareness Day.

On this day, our Supported Students will be selling sweet treats at lunch and recess and all the money raised will go directly to ASPECT (Autism Spectrum Australia). ASPECT is Australia's largest service provider for people and families living with

Autism. They are passionate about providing the highest quality of services to people of all ages around Australia to ensure that people with Autism live the life that they deserve.

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a lifelong neurodevelopmental condition. It is characterised by differences in behaviour, social interaction and communication. These differences can make every day interactions incredibly challenging for someone with an Autism diagnosis. It is a disorder that effects 1 in 68 children worldwide and is found most often in boys.

International Autism Awareness Day means so much to the students of Finley High School who have Autism or live with somebody who has Autism. We hope that this day removes the negative stigma that surrounds the disorder and helps make our students more aware of some of the challenges that their peers face.

Finley High School Uniform Policy Reminder

All students are required to wear full correct school uniform every day – see uniform details below. For safety reasons **leather shoes are mandatory** for all lessons other than sport/PE practical. **Shoes should be** <u>all black</u> – shoes with white soles and/or logos are not school uniform. During cold weather, additional, non-uniform warm clothing should not be visible.

Please note:

• An **occasional** courtesy note/email from home to excuse uniform for a day or two is acceptable. Student will be issued with a green permission slip.

If a student has reason to be out of uniform for more than a couple of days, please contact the school by phone to discuss the matter (Mrs Braybon or Mrs Jackson). **Note** that leather shoes will still be required for all practical classroom lessons (Science, Food tech, Metalwork etc).

• An out-of-uniform red slip will be issued to any other student wearing unacceptable uniform items; after three red slips, a letter will be sent home indicating that the student has been placed on Level 3 Uniform.

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) **2018** LETTER TO PARENTS

In May 2018 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy skills of students across Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Student background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) will be collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The NAPLAN tests will be conducted from 15-17 May 2018.

In the numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. In Years 7 and 9 there will be one numeracy test with two parts: Part A calculator is allowed and Part B where calculators are not to be used. For the calculator test, the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.

Friday 18 May – A 'catch-up' day is scheduled for students who missed a test or were absent on a test day. Students may be considered for exemption from the tests if they:

- are newly arrived in Australia (less than one year before the test) and with a language background other than English, or
- have significant intellectual disability and/or significant co-existing conditions which severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests.

All other students are expected to participate in the tests. Disability adjustments which reflect the student's normal level of support in the classroom may be provided. Large print, braille, coloured paper versions and electronic tests are available to meet the needs of individual students.

Access to disability adjustments or exemption from the tests must be discussed with the school principal and a parent or carer consent form must be signed.

Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents in consultation with the school principal. If you wish to withdraw your child from the tests, a parent or carer consent form must be signed.

CONSENT FOR DISABILITY ADJUSTMENTS

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) PARENT/CARER CONSENT FOR DISABILITY ADJUSTMENTS 2018

In May 2018 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. NAPLAN will assess the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement and will be able to compare their child's performance against the national minimum standard. A student with a significant intellectual and/or functional disability may be exempt. However, all other students are expected to participate in NAPLAN and disability adjustments may be made to support individual students. Adjustments to testing conditions should reflect the normal support the student receives in the classroom. Parents should discuss the adjustments that can be accessed by their child with the child's teacher and the principal. Large print, braille and coloured paper versions of the tests are available for students registered with the NSW DOE, NSW CEC or NSW AIS as vision impaired.
