Hayley Doohan, Kim Montgomery, Rebecca Pierce and Lauren Steel were given an insight into the work of agricultural and veterinary scientists. The day provided an opportunity for students to see the science in action, encouraging them to consider a future in the agricultural supply chain. They participated in carcase workshops, including taste testing of beef, went unground into the Rhizolysimeter to observe root growth in canola and rotated through workshops involving food quality and sensory evaluation.

Art Excursion

On the last day of term, Mr and Mrs Clark accompanied stage 6 Visual Arts students to Melbourne to visit the National Gallery of Victoria. We attended two major exhibitions that survey a wide range of artworks.

Firstly, we attended the Triennial exhibition, a contemporary art exhibition featuring the work of over 100 artists and designers from 32 countries. The NGV Triennial surveys the world of art and design, across cultures, scales, geographies and perspectives.

Secondly, we attended the *Colony* exhibition at the Federation Square Gallery. This exhibition that explores Australia's complex colonial past and the art that emerged during and in response to this period. Drawing from public and private collections across the country, Colony: Australia 1770–1861 brings together the most important examples of art and design produced during this period and surveys the key settlements and development of life and culture in the colonies. Importantly, the exhibition acknowledges the impact of European settlement on Indigenous communities.

Before we left Melbourne, Mr and Mrs Clark led the students through the laneways of the CBD to show the students the many significant Street Artworks that are throughout the streets. Special attention was made to ensure that we visited the work of Adnate. This artist donated one of his works to the school a few years ago. This piece is proudly hung near the steps that the students use to walk up to the art room.

Overall, it was a great day full of amazing artworks. It is hoped that the Stage 5 Creative Arts students will be able to experience a similar excursion in semester two of this year.



Finley High School excel in netball

Finley High School have had great success in school netball in 2018. On the 14th June, the Open Netball Team won the Riverina Championship. The Riverina Region includes Wagga Wagga, Albury, Griffith, Deniliquin and all surrounding areas. There were four pools, each consisting of five teams. Finley won all their pool games comfortably, allowing them to qualify for the semi-finals. Their semi-final was against Billabong High School, which Finley won by 7. Finley then played Deniliquin High School in the grand final and were victors by five goals. This has qualified them to represent the Riverina Region at the State Championship at Wollongong in August. The last time the Open Team qualified for this championship was in 2002.

In the Riverina under 15's Championship, Finley High School made it to the grand final, coming second. Within this competition there were twenty four teams competing for the title. The girls competed in a tournament in Wagga earlier this year and won all their games on the day, before losing to Albury High School in the grand final.

For Finley to come first in the Open competition and second in the under 15's is an amazing effort. Both teams being in the top two teams is incredible. Netball is a dominant sport within this region and many of the schools that we are competing against, have significantly larger populations.

Improved wireless and internet services will also give students more chances to connect and collaborate and greater access to online knowledge databases, streaming media, educational institutions and experts.

We are working with our Technical Officer to ensure that disruptions during the installation are kept to a minimum.

Introducing Connecting Country Schools

Modern teaching practices require reliable access to the internet and online learning materials. Schools need strong and extensive wireless infrastructure to support future focused learning.

Regional schools offer quality teaching and learning experiences enriched by online tools and digital resources.

The 2017/18 state budget included funding to improve wireless services and internet access in regional schools. Additional funding has also been allocated for local area network remediation and other special projects.

Connecting Country Schools will upgrade wireless services in more than 13,000 learning spaces in more than 900 regional schools.

For Students

We live in a digital age where our students need new knowledge and skills to succeed in their studies today and their lives ahead.

To hold digital-age jobs, our students will need to think critically, solve problems creatively, work in teams, communicate clearly in a range of media and continue to learn new and ever-evolving technologies.

Improved wireless and internet services will give students more chances to connect and collaborate and greater access to online knowledge databases, streaming media, educational institutions and experts.

For Teachers

Immediate and reliable access to digital resources, anywhere, anytime on mobile devices, is at the heart of flexible, responsive, future focused learning.

This access is essential to student centred pedagogical approaches such as inquiry, project and problem based learning.

Network reliant technologies such as virtual reality, robotics and artificialint elligence will soon be common in K-12 dassrooms.

Together with increasing use of cloud based software and storage solutions, these new tools and new ways of teaching require new standards of wireless connectivity.

For Schools

Improved wireless services will also ensure schools can make full use of resources such as the new web-based school library system.

It will allow better support for secondary students enrolled in vocational courses at TAFE through improved access to online course materials.

Schools will also have access to new tools to monitor and manage their ICT, and analytics about the use of technology across their sites.

An innovation fund will be offered to support further investment in locally sourced solutions, and the sharing of excellence between schools across the state.

For Communities

Connecting Country Schools will also deliver a range of benefits beyond the school gate.

The Department of Education is engaging suppliers to deliver and support the program, creating jobs across the

Schools will be encouraged to use this core infrastructure to build a smart and connected school, as a centre for both learning excellence and community engagement.

Implementation

Pilots have been run across the state to test the new equipment, the delivery and support model for Connecting Country Schools.

The full rollout commenced in Term 1, 2018 and the project is scheduled to conclude October 2019.

We will liaise with schools on the delivery schedule to ensure timing suits the school's needs.

Regular updates, training, support and resources to make the best use of the new environment will also be delivered throughout the transition.
