Careers News

On Tuesday 18th and Wednesday 19th June Finley High School hosted the Future Directions Team from CSU. Groups of students from Years 7-10 worked through workshops and activities that looked at skills and mindsets required to aspire to future success post school. Students in Years 9 and 10 completed problem solving tasks and communication games whilst working collaboratively in small groups.

Year 10 Workshops focused on finding and matching skills/interests with a job they want to do and subject selection.

Year 9 workshops looked at skills for the future and the concept of there no longer being "a job for life". They brainstormed and designed apps and products for the future world.

Year 8 students played a careers game of "life" where they experienced the concepts of balancing lifestyle payments and weekly bills on their set budgets. This also used a variety of literacy and numeracy skills, as well as IT skills in using the ipads to transfer money around in the game. The true expenses of life became quite real to a few who ended up bankrupt by the end of the activity.

Year 7 students completed the "Career In a Bag" game where they matched everyday life activities and tools to possible career pathways.

These workshops will now be followed up with interested students in Year 9 having the opportunity to attend an on Campus Day at CSU Thurgoona where they can attend university style tutorial workshops and do a tour of the campus facilities as they begin to plan their post school options.

K9 Program

The first round of our K-9 Teach program has concluded and I have given approval for this to be extended.

K9TEACH is a Animal-Assisted Intervention and Therapy Dog team, consisting of a dog named Boofred and his human companion, Melissa, who is also a teacher. Melissa and Boofred offer a range of Animal-Assisted Interventions such as:

- School (primary school, high school, or other) programs/visits with a curriculum based learning outcome
- School visits that are purely therapy focused
- Tutoring
- Workplace therapy visits for morale

The difference Boofred makes when he comes to school and interacts with the students has been remarkable.

Boofred has been visiting selected students through-out term 2 at Finley High School and the students are very enthusiastic participants in the program. Boofred is a welcome visitor to school who brings a great deal of calm to the classrooms he is working in.

Students participating in the program had been identified as needing support in social situations and with developing positive interactions with peers. Boofred has enabled these students to interact in a positive manner, be supportive of peers and develop empathy for others.

He has been able to develop connections with high needs students and the program has seen a steady increase of positive interactions between the students themselves as well as with Boofred. Boofred has the ability to assist in the development of communication with students we have seen significant improvement in eye contact.

LaST Report

ACARA online testing in Term 3

Our school has been selected to participate in the ACARA item Trial, to be conducted using the Online National Assessment platform. Pearson has been appointed to administer the Item trial on behalf of ACARA. This is not a school readiness test for Naplan online.

The aim of the Item trial is to evaluate Naplan test items that are under consideration for inclusion in future tests. It will be conducted on 6th and 7th August 2019 for Year 7 and Year 9, which is next term.

Naplan protocols allow any student to be withdrawn on the basis of a disability or parent withdrawal based on religious or philosophical reasons. There are no special accommodations in the tests.

There are different sessions, assessing both Reading and Numeracy. Both exams are 85 minutes long, and have been scheduled for periods 1-4, with a break in between. Permission notes will be sent out shortly with further information.

Minimum Standards Test

Over the past few weeks Year 11 have been provided with an opportunity to fulfil the requirements of the Minimum Standards in Reading, Writing and Numeracy. Results should be forthcoming within the term. Students can be provided in many opportunities to achieve the standards. The next sessions will be scheduled for early term 4.

Best Start Assessment

Best Start Assessment occurred in Term 1 this year for all Year 7 students. Best Start Assessment results can be shared with Year 7 parents upon request. This will aid in identification of areas that your child may be experiencing difficulty in Literacy and Numeracy in previous stages of learning. Please contact the school for your child's results.

NCDD

The National Collection of Disability Data has been collected. Parents should have been contacted and learning adjustments been implemented for students. If you believe that your child requires some adjustments due to a learning condition, please don't hesitate to contact the school and make an appointment.

LaST targeted learning groups.

Where are they now? - Derek Silby – FHS HSC 1984

- Where are you originally from?
 I grew up on a farm between Berrigan and Barooga.
- What years were you a student at FHS? 1979 to 1984
- What is your current position / vocation? Founder of an app based tech start-up.
- 4. How would you describe your pathway from Finley High School to this position?

Went to University in Sydney. Initially studied Aeronautical Engineering before switching to Civil after first year.

I moved to the United Kingdom in 1991, initially working in my profession as a Civil Engineer. Fairly quickly I changed tack by starting as a management trainee with a national parcel delivery company owned by Mayne Nickless, beginning a fairly long association with Logistics.

After managing an operation calling on 4000 customers per day I moved from "parcels" to "warehouses". This eventually took my young family to the US were I managed JCB's North American spare parts operation embedding Lean principles. JCB implemented the large computer system "SAP" which was a disaster for six months. However it forced me to understand in detail how systems interacted with the physical operation.

I returned to the UK in a project management role. Initially this involved rearranging warehouses and group projects, however in time I found myself working for large IT departments – sometimes sorting out projects that had gone wrong.

The combined experience of operational logistics and IT allowed me to develop a solution to a thorny problem – continuous improvement of exceptions within the supply chain. We have since found this solution can be applied to other scenarios both inside and outside of supply chain.

 Bachelor of Engineering (Civil) from the University of Sydney.
- 6. Where have you lived since High School?
 Sydney during University.
 UK Birmingham, London, and Banbury.
 USA Savannah, Georgia.
- What are your favourite memories of FHS?
 I really enjoyed my HSC years. Up to Year 11 school was a bit of a drag, however from Year 11 I really started to enjoy both the study and friends. We had very good teachers at the time, a good head teacher, and we got on as a year group.

8. Greatest achievements so far?

I have always enjoyed my work – mainly because if I wasn't, I did something about it. I have only ever been fired from one job – or almost fired – by Mrs Wong who ran the café in the Grandstand Bar at Uni. I never wrote up the menu properly, as I frequently got her instructions wrong.

My bosses and colleagues have always been sorry to see me go.

9. Other relevant life experiences you have had?

I spent quite a long time working with a French company which took me to Germany, France, Switzerland, Portugal and Greece. My colleagues in these places were great ambassadors for their countries and we managed to have fun alongside work. Germany is a great place to visit, which isn't well known.

To stay fit I do a lot of walking with mates, and race flatwater kayaks with our local club.

10. Tips or advice for our current students.

Give things a good try, but if not working, adjust. Leisure wise, if someone asks you along to do something new – if not illegal or dangerous - give it a go. Get/stay involved with your local community, particularly as you get older. Use social media sparingly.
