Commerce

Trade Trafficker News

The second half of the year saw a very hard-working Commerce class build their knowledge and skills in a wide range of areas. One of the highlights was the Running a Business unit, during which students operated their Market Day operations. The followings are some samples of their work from the unit including some conclusions from the assessment tasks:



I do not believe our business would not be sustainable at school as they would not comply with the healthy schools standards. It would also not be as popular during the warmer terms 1 and 4. I also think students and staff would become uninterested in nuggets.

The results of the customer satisfaction survey were very positive as 45% of people said it was very good and 43% of people said it was good. We could have improved by being more prepared and getting more time to cook the chicken nuggets. We also could have marked each bag with a T for tempura, C for crumbed and D for Dino chicken nuggets which would have made things easier. The average of our customer service satisfaction survey was 85.551%.

During this topic of 'Running a Business' I learnt how to manage finances and make a cost benefit analysis. I also learnt that things in a business can change and you have to think of a way to accommodate the changes quickly and efficiently. You also have to be able to communicate with your business partners and the customers. You also need to have plans in places to aid you in running your business." -Rosie

"What I have learnt about running a business through market day is to never overestimate the number of products you

should produce. In our case, this just leads to food waste and gross old toasties at the end. Listening closer to your customers and market can help guide business owners on how much they should make. Early on in the lunch time period people could realise how unpopular our store was, therefore expecting a price drop. This meant no one really wanted to purchase the cheese toasties for the original price and just waited until they dropped. This was quite negative for our business as we were not making the estimated amount of profit." - Samantha

"Things i have learnt about running a market day stall is that it is a little bit of work to trying set up and to plan what you are doing but after you figure all of that out it is quite fun running it, it was great to be able to experience what it was like and it was a good learning experience for all of us. Another thing I have learnt is advertising is important, the way your shop is presented is also quite important and the products you are selling are important. Our prices were quite cheap but I think that's why people kept coming back and buying lots more of what we had to offer, also we made a decent profit which we were all happy about. So that is what I've learnt about running a stall, I think it was great fun and would definitely do it again." - Kyra

"I think what I have learned about running a business is that you need to be aware of all the variables when attempting to run a business. Our group didn't consider the fact that the toasties would go cold and soggy and so we prepared them all ahead of time. In hindsight we only needed two people at the actual stall as Cutta and Sam had already finished all of the toasties and were just left standing around not really doing anything so I think that is we were to attempt it again doing toasties again we would prepare a batch of toasties before lunch and then prepare the rest of the toasties throughout lunch. Another variable that we didn't consider was how the toasties actually tasted. We never made a toastie beforehand using the ingredients that we used on market day so we didn't know whether or not they tasted good and I believe if we had prepared one beforehand we would have added ham to the toasties to make them taste better. I also believed that we should have attempted to market our toasties better as people might have brought the lack of ham up before market day which might have let us make a last minute change to our recipe. Also I made an observation I made about the other groups. They offered more options for customers to choose from and It appeared that they were more successful so perhaps we should have offered more than cheese toasties and a guess to win a jar of jelly beans. In the end we did end up with a profit so it was still a success." - Jye

Finley High School introduced a new program called "IXL" (I excel) in 2017.

How does IXL Run?

- IXL is run for Years 11 and 12 will run as a 3-period block once per week.
- Teachers of years 11 and 12 will provide work for students in their classes to complete during IXL. <u>These tasks</u> <u>are compulsory</u>. Teachers set, check and monitor that these tasks have been completed. In some circumstances, the tasks form the foundation of future learning in the classroom.

- Students will be provided with a booklet that they will complete each week. In the IXL booklet, students will plan their IXL time to ensure that all their allocated tasks are completed. This booklet will be kept and monitored on a weekly basis by the IXL coordinator.
- ATTENDANCE AT IXL SESSIONS IS COMPULSORY. Parents of absent students will be contacted each week.

What are the goals of IXL?

- We want all students who leave Finley High school to have skills for life. IXL is to encourage senior students to become lifelong independent learners and develop organisational and planning skills. Students will develop responsibility and accountability for more of their learning.
- Reducing face-to-face teaching in the HSC course by 1 period per subject per cycle has enabled 1 extra subject to be offered on each line.
- This has broadened the curriculum in the senior school.

Where does IXL occur?

• IXL sessions occur in the VTR and library which have been refurbished for this program. The library is be closed to all other classes during these times and will be for the exclusive use of Year 11 or Year 12.

Who will supervise IXL sessions?

• IXL sessions will be supervised by the IXL coordinator and the teacher librarian.

Continued,

Year 11 and 12 Teacher Responsibilities

- Each week teachers set meaningful and compulsory learning activities for students to complete during IXL sessions (preferably with written instructions).
- Appropriate tasks could include: Reading and note taking from texts, answering exercises and questions from texts, answering exam style and past HSC questions, working on assessment tasks, preparing topic summaries, watching videos or movies that are directly related to course work (students must supply own earphones/buds), completing interactive tutorials and animations.
- Check and mark any set work and follow up with appropriate communication with the student and home. Record this in the HSC Monitoring folder.

Year 11 and 12 Student Responsibilities

- **BE RESPECTFUL**: to each other, to staff and to the library, following all rules on behaviour and attendance during IXL.
- **BE RESPONSIBLE**: be punctual and bring everything you require for 3 periods of independent learning during IXL each week.
- **BE LEARNING**: make wise use of your time; do your best to work hard and maintain your focus; develop some self-discipline and academic rigour. Your teachers will have supplied learning activities for you to do!
