This week we celebrated and gave out awards to those students who were identified as having achieved at an outstanding level all term. During my speech below, I focused on some key points.

Next week we celebrate NAIDOC week in the community and next term here at Finley High. We have 31 very proud young Aboriginal students who attend this school, and we stand with you and this year's theme of getting up, standing up and showing up.

This theme can take on many meanings, contexts and forms. But I want all of us to think about this theme and what it means to you. As students and staff, I believe we continue to learn, understand and accept each other for our differences, learn from our past and be better in the future.

This theme resonates with me in other ways as well. The last two years have been a struggle and now is the time to get up, stand up and show up. Work hard in class, attend school and be in the moment, engaged ready to learn. Life goes way too fast. Just ask our Year 12 cohort who have one term of high school left. Where did those years go? Do not waste your education and make the most of your opportunities.

A great education has allowed me to travel the world, enjoy a good life, have a great job. So, I say it again. Do not waste your education and make the most of your opportunities.

I want to go back to my comment earlier, as students and staff I believe we continue to learn, understand and accept each other for our differences, learn from our past and be better in the future.

This brings my second important point to accept each other for our differences. If we avoid making judgements based on impressions or another person's opinion and take the time to actually understand and get to know each other, not only will you become a better person but you will come to the understanding that we are all different and we need to learn to live in harmony.

I have been fortunate to travel around the world meeting people of different colour, race, religious beliefs, sexual beliefs, cultural differences. Only last term I spent Ramadan with an Islamic family. I played football with the Wanders in Darwin many years ago where the majority of my team were Aboriginal. I've visited temples and mosques. I know the most amazing people who identify as gay or transgender. We need a school and community who accepts everybody for whom they are and their beliefs. Maybe you are the odd one out because you cannot accept that people are different from you, and you are afraid to get to know anyone outside your very small world.

Today's celebration marks the culmination of a very busy term and recognises those students who have demonstrated the commitment, dedication and behaviour to be awarded with a certificate. It is expected that you are:

- Attending school every day,
- Respecting all property and do not intimidate or harass others.

Girls Do the Maths

OnFriday, 24th June, six Year 10 girls set up base in the library to participate in the Girls Do the Maths webinar hosted by UNSW. They were welcomed by the first ever female Head of the School of Maths and Stats at UNSW, Adelle Coster.

Following this, they listened to a presentation on Mathematical Modelling in Scheduling and Planning in Real-World Problems. The presenter, Hamideh Anjomshoa, also talked a little of her background, moving to Australia, a place she chose to move to because she thought it would be warmer than Canada, and her journey studying Mathematics as a female.

The third activity was 'Counting Conundrums'. Students were put into breakout rooms where they were able to interact with students and teachers from other schools across the state. These breakout rooms were led by UNSW students, who offered advice and clues to help them strategise the best way to solve problems. Interestingly, we were able to link and solve the four outwardly different problems using similar strategies.

We concluded the morning with a Q&A from four UNSW students who were studying some form of Mathematics at uni. They were able to offer advice about the different pathways into studying maths degrees (turns out you don't need to do Extension maths!), their experiences studying and working in male-dominated fields and general advice about university life. We could have talked to them all day. In all, the girls enjoyed the challenge of 'Counting Conundrums' and interacting with other students the most. Well done girls on your fantastic participation in the event.



Agriculture – Poll Dorset Association Visit

We were excited to host 13 members of the Goulburn Valley region of the Poll Dorset Association on Friday the 24th of June. The group was on a tour of the NSW region and asked if they could come and see our school and our sheep.

The visitors were very interested in the varied programs we run at school and were impressed with the agricultural opportunities students were afforded. They recognised that no other schools in their region, to their knowledge, had programs like us.


These are the instructions for parents who use the Parent Portal for booking Interviews.

You will see your timer banner in the top bar of your screen to advise how long you have to finalise your bookings. As there is often a large volume of parents and teachers making bookings, this will ensure that all parents have the chance to schedule a booking with the required staff members.

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
Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD)

Over the past semester the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data (NCCD) has occurred. It required staff to identify students that require additional assistance in their learning, and record the type and frequency of the learning supports provided. The NCCD draws upon teacher professional judgement and practices to support students with a disability to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students. Parents will receive notification if their child has been included in the data collection.


History

One of the topics 'World History' students have studied this semester is *Family History*. For this, they were tasked with choosing an ancestor of theirs and completing research into their life and the time period in which they lived. We would like to share the life stories of Carl Friedrich Kleinschmidt, Leonard Hubertus Ernest Bauer, Florence Jean Robertson and Michele Di Lullo.

Miss Wadsworth – History Teacher This week we feature Leonard Hubertus Ernest Bauer and Michele Di Lullo

Leonard Hubertus Ernest Bauer

25th February 1933- 1st July 2011



Leonard married Sophie Gerdadina Hubertina

Widdershoven, a pharmacist, on 21/08/1957. They had four children before migrating to Australia in November 1962, Maria (05/02/1959), Robert (Kurt) (17/01/1960), Anne (01/08/1961) and Henriette (01/08/1961). It took three months on a boat to reach Australia, meeting many other European migrants. They settled in the Maribyrnong Migrant Hostel, where he sold carpets and then worked as a labourer in a glass factory.

In 1963 they moved to Noble Park, where Susan was born. They then relocated the family to a small farm in Pakenham, where Leonard began a plastering and painting business while Sophie reared calves and ran the farm. On the 30th of March 1967, Paul was born. From here, they moved to Neerim South, where they purchased a 110-acre dairy farm and milked up to 80 cows, with Leonard supplementing the income with painting and odd jobs. Their last child, Mark, was born on the 3rd of May 1974.

In 1980, Leonard, Sophie, Kurt, Susan, Paul and Mark relocated to the Riverina to expand their dairy business and purchased a property 17km north of Barooga, 'Kooringal'. They converted the sheep and cropping farm to a dairy farm, Kurt and Paul assisting in the construction of dairy infrastructure. They bought two more properties to accommodate their expanding herd, building a new 60 unit rotary dairy in 2001. Sophie passed away of Breast Cancer on 27/06/2001.





Leonard struggled with the loss of Sophie, but with his family's help, he could stay on the farm. Leonard was a resourceful man continuing his creative passions in the form of winemaking, painting, lead lighting, drawing, pottery and machinery fabrication. Leonard was blessed with 23 grandchildren. He passed away on the first of July 2011.



Michele Di Lullo

Michele Di Lullo was born in Civitella Messer Raimondo Chieti, Italia (Italy) on May 6th 1922. Michele was the youngest of two sons, with his older brother Luigi being only 3 years older than him. Michele and his family lived in a small village in the mountains, his father owned a very small vineyard and his mother was a housewife. Michele had a very close relationship with his mother and didn't enjoy being with his father much as he was abusive.

Michele had to grow up in a time when food was scarce and rationing and theft of food was extremely



common, he witnessed the war camps and what would happen to the people that did not obey the rules of Mussolini. Because of the war, the village and his family were extremely poor, many of the families in the village starved and went without many meals as it was far too expensive. The climate in the village was short, hot, dry summers and long, very cold winters; because of the freezing temperatures in winter. Michele would often become sick and his family was too poor to afford the medications, so his brother would often steal from other people in the village and then sell the items in neighbouring villages to get his brother the medicine he desperately needed.

After World War 2, the economy of Italy hit an all time low and the village had run out of resources. In 1952, Michele decided to travel to Rome by himself and get on a boat to start a new life. After weeks on a boat with hundreds of other immigrants, he landed in Sydney, but after a few months of the horrible discrimination from Australians and the lack of jobs offered he moved to Adelaide. In Adelaide, there were less job opportunities and more discrimination, he then finally found a job in Melbourne working in a factory.

By early 60's Michele found the love of his life. Her name was Maria, she was a shoe maker and worked out of a family business. Though she was 22 years younger than him they immediately fell in love, she was Italian and was from a small village in the same region as him. They did not waste any time before they got married and moved to the country of NSW, a small town that was perfect to grow Mediterranean plants as the climate is very similar. With the dream of a vineyard they bought a small farm and not long after they had their first child, Etore Di Lullo.

Soon after Etore was born he tragically drowned. Both heart broken, they moumed the loss of their 5 month old and waited a few more years to try for another child. 2 years after Etore's death they had another son, they named him Pedro and then 4 years after Pedro, they had another child but this time a girl, they decided to name her Luigina, after Michele's beloved brother. They were a happy family, finally accepted in the community and living on their dream farm.

7 years after Luigina was born Maria had another child, another boy, they called him Adrian and continued to live their happy life on their farm. Once Pedro was old enough to go to boarding school in Melbourne he went and he enjoyed every part. One school night Pedro and his friends went into the

basement because his friends wanted a cigarette, the match was lit and a massive gas explosion was caused. Pedro passed away 2 weeks after the incident and all his friends that were in the same basement had survived. Michele and Maria were again heartbroken, their eldest living son tragically died at the age of 17 while at school, their lives once again were torn apart.

3 years after the death of their son, their only daughter was in a horrific bus accident while going to Finley High School one moming, she received great injuries but survived. After the accidents with their past 3 children Michele and Maria took extra care of Adrian and protected him from everything and anything.

They got to watch Adrian grow and get married and have 4 children: Casey, Glen, Nicola and Matthew. He loved his grandchildren, he would often tell them stories and loved seeing them. In 2016 Michele suffered his first stroke, but after a few months of therapy he made a decent recovery.



Until May 26th 2016 when he suffered his second stroke and passed away just 20 days after his 94th birthday. He left behind his wife, his 2 children and his 4 grandchildren.
