Respectful, Responsible Learners

History

One of the topics 'World History' students have studied this semester is *Family History*. For this, they were tasked with choosing an ancestor of theirs and completing research into their life and the time period in which they lived. We would like to share the life stories of Carl Friedrich Kleinschmidt, Leonard Hubertus Ernest Bauer, Florence Jean Robertson and Michele Di Lullo.

This week we feature Carl Friedrich Kleinschmidt and Florence Jean Robertson

Carl Friedrich Kleinschmidt

Friedrich was born in a small provincial village on the 7th of September 1820, in Prussia. He was born in Stegelitz, a village 80km North of Berlin, however he was raised in the village of *Berkenlatten*, where he met his wife, Justine Caroline who he married on the 20th of January 1850. Their first child, Ferdinand was born in 1849, their second child Bertha was born in 1853, their third child Friedrich was born in 1855, and Albert who was born in 1857.

Friedrich completed the mandatory military service required of male Prussian citizens and was discharged from the 8th infantry Regiment in 1859. Friedrich was the village carpenter, and kept a respectable sized orchard as well, but due to the strict social and economic hierarchy of Prussia in the mid 19th century, land ownership was impossible for the working class. For the last hundred years, the Kleinschmidt family had been on land that was leased from the noble von Arnim family. Friedrich, enticed by the prospect of owning and working his own land, filled out an '*Entlassungs-urkunde*', or a document that granted full governmental approval to emigrate from Prussia to Australia. This granted them official permission to leave, however a clause of the contract is that the family had to



renounce their Prussian citizenship and accept that they will not be accepted back into the country.

On the 15th of September 1863, Friedrich, Justine, and their four children boarded the ship named 'Susanne Godeffroy' in the Port of Hamburg with 16 other families to begin the voyage to Queensland. Life on the ship was hard, with shortages in drinking water and constant sea-sickness, but after five months of sailing on rough seas, Friedrich and his family anchored in Moreton Bay on the 18th of January 1864.

Friedrich then laid claim to the land near Pimpama Island and Logan River, planning to grow cane in the lagoons and swamps that he now owned. The town that the Kleinschmidt family helped found was named Steiglitz, in honour of the village that they had left behind. The Stegelitz Sugar Mill was successful, and made Friedrich a wealthy man

processing sugar cane and arrowroot. The mill continued to be run long after Friedrich's death. The Kleinschmidt farmers were even featured in a political cartoon scrutinising the fact that so much Australian-grown produce was being exported to Germany.

Friedrich and Justine had six more children in Queensland, Otto in October 1865, Johann in October 1867, Anna in 1868, Magdalene in 1870, Auguste in August 1872, and Carl in 1875.

Friedrich died in 1908 and Justine died in 1908, and they are both buried in Pimpama Island Cemetery, facing the jungle that they were met when they first arrived four decades prior, leaving behind a legacy of pioneering and industriousness.



Florence Jean Robertson

Florence Jean Robertson was born on the 13th of August 1923. Her parents are Andrew Alexander Robertson and Alma Elizabath Thomas. Her siblings are David, Lance, Eric, and Jessie. She had 5 children, Neil (1946), Ian (1949), Kaye (1952), Glen (1957), and Douglas (1959). Her children were born quite separate compared to others during this time period. She played cricket with the boys when she was young and played tennis when she was older.

Florence has experienced what life has to offer. Living as a child through the Great Depression, her parents were told to live off \$60 for groceries, for a whole year. She went to school until she was 15 years old and met the love of her life at this time as well. His name was Herbert James Sutton. Herbert was an engineer and went to the army. Leaving Florence at home while he went around the country and to Papua New Guinea. She also had her two brothers go to war andher father who went to WW1 and ended up going to Gallipoli. The war significantly affected Florence's father, Andrew, as he (and I quote from Florence), "was a crippled". He was broken and lost after the war. When her loved ones returned they didn't want to talk so Florence

respected their choice and left it at that.

She worked as a nurse, delivering babies and was restricted from leaving the hospital in Wagga Wagga. She was needing money to support her family and also wanted to work, as she enjoyed her job. She was only able to leave once her brother got sick and Florence went back home to the farm to help out her mother. Living far out of town, she didn't see many other people. She went on the horse and sulky to drive to places. There weren't many communication systems, but a telecom was what was available. They had to get the battery and take it to the postman to charge it or get a new one. She enjoyed the isolation as she never liked to "be in the limelight", loving to be in the background. She seems very closed off now, not a very trusting person and not open to others, voluntarily.

She got her driver's license when she was married and drove around her kids, to go to mainly sporting events. She never really liked cars. When asked about horses she mentions how her husband loved them but she didn't really like them either. So I ask the controversial question, "which one would you prefer, a horse or car, if you had to pick?" After a lot of thought she finally concludes that she would probably prefer a horse. Her mind is open to the evolution of technologies, but she still would prefer what she grew up with, what's familiar. Her driver's license was

confiscated in 2004 because of her age and she didn't mind it being taken away.

Throughout her life she lived at Berelyn at New Dale, then went to Ballarat for 2 and a half years, got married and went to Sydney for 12 months, went to Wagga to work as a nurse then went to Deniliquin and has lived there ever since.



The events taken place in her life are nothing short of extraordinary, she has faced tragedy, loss, heartbreak and her resilience to keep going is incredible. She's living a long, fulfilled life. She currently lives in Deniliquin still, is 98 years old and counting, still happy and still getting out into the world.

The MADDD evening is held at FHS every year, involving music, drama, dance and design. Students and teachers participate at this event performing either as a solo, duo, or as a group. Earlier in the week there is a daytime matinee performance of the students performing to feeder primary school students. One of the participants of MADDD is a year 11 senior student Dan Barnes. We sat down with him to discuss MADDD and his past performances, his values and beliefs. He plays guitar and is known to be one of the popular music/drama students in the school, and studies music as a subject at the school.

How long have you participated in MADDD in your school life? "This is my second year now"

What were your past performances?

"My past performances were when I played in a band with Mr Burdon, Cate Turley, Destin and myself".

What's your purpose for participating in this fun event?

"Mostly I was talked into it by LJ Burdon. But I also want to improve my ability to play on stage".

Has participating in MADDD boosted up your self-esteem and your comfort zone? If so, what improvements were made?

"Yes definitely. It has improved my ability to speak in front of people better, and overall confidence as a person".

Would you encourage new junior students to participate? If so, what would your encouragement statement be for them?

"Definitely. It is a great opportunity not only to improve self-confidence, but to get other people confident in you and your talents".

What song pieces do you like performing?

"In front of a big crowd it is probably going to be my original songs. In smaller areas that recognisable songs, like ADC and stuff like that, I usually go with it".

When the pandemic first hit in 2020, the MADDD Night event was cancelled that year. How has it affected you and the other students that wanted to perform?

"I'm not too sure about the other students but, it affected me in a way because that was going to be my first year performing. Sadly it was not."

Do you want to continue performing or playing an instrument later in life? "Definitely! That is actually my one goal in life."

Has MADDD helped you figure out your sense of identity? Has performing made you a better person?

"Yes! Performing has made me respect myself and my skills, especially as a guitarist much more; and has made part of my actual personality".

Do you believe music, drama, and the arts have brought a significant impact in society? And is this a tool to get people and communities together?

"I'd say definitely, because music, art and all of those things that draw people together like creativity. People are created with art and people are created with music. And when people get creative together, beautiful things happen."


From the Wellbeing Team




